
Across America By Motorcycle 1919: A Journey Through Time





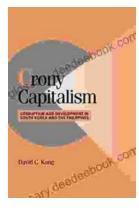
