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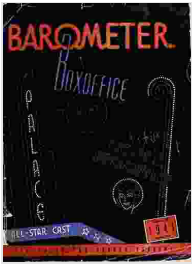

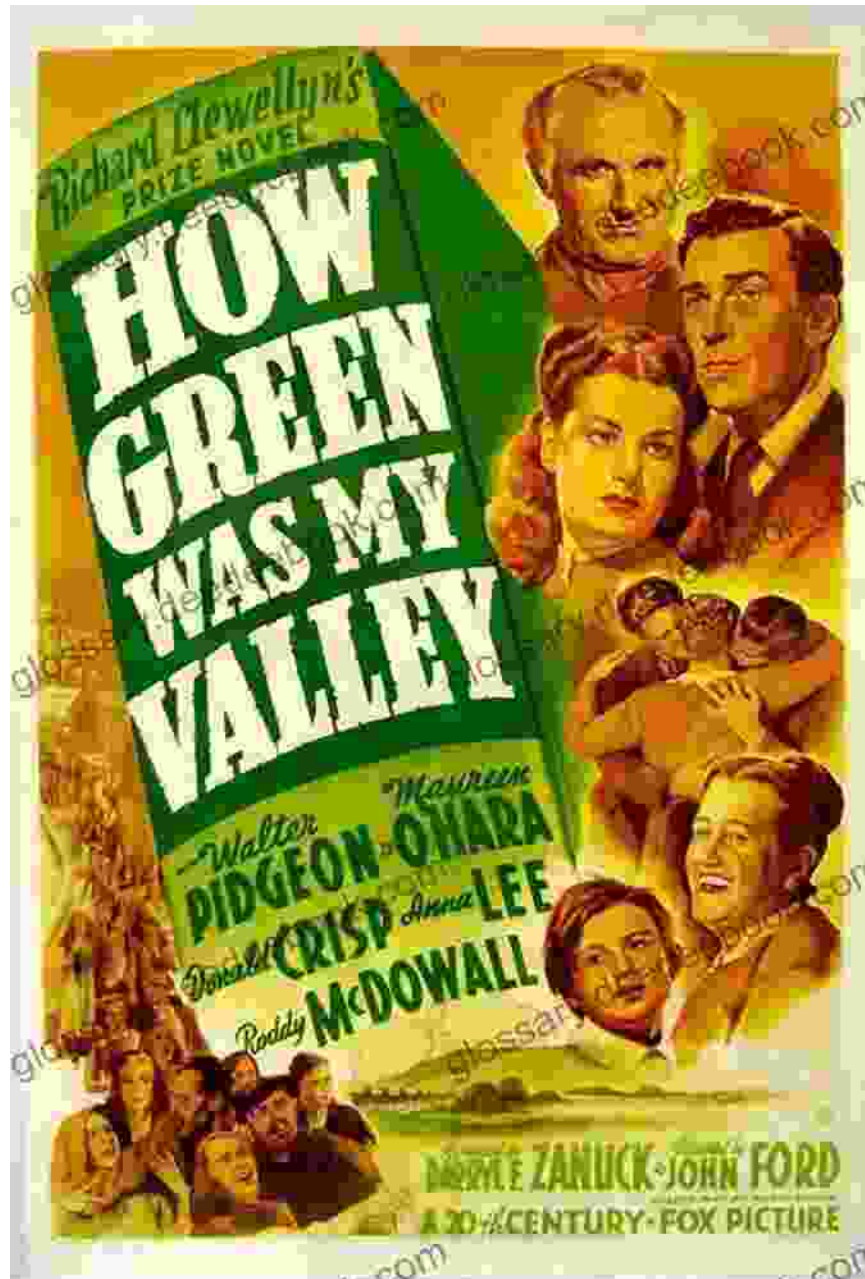

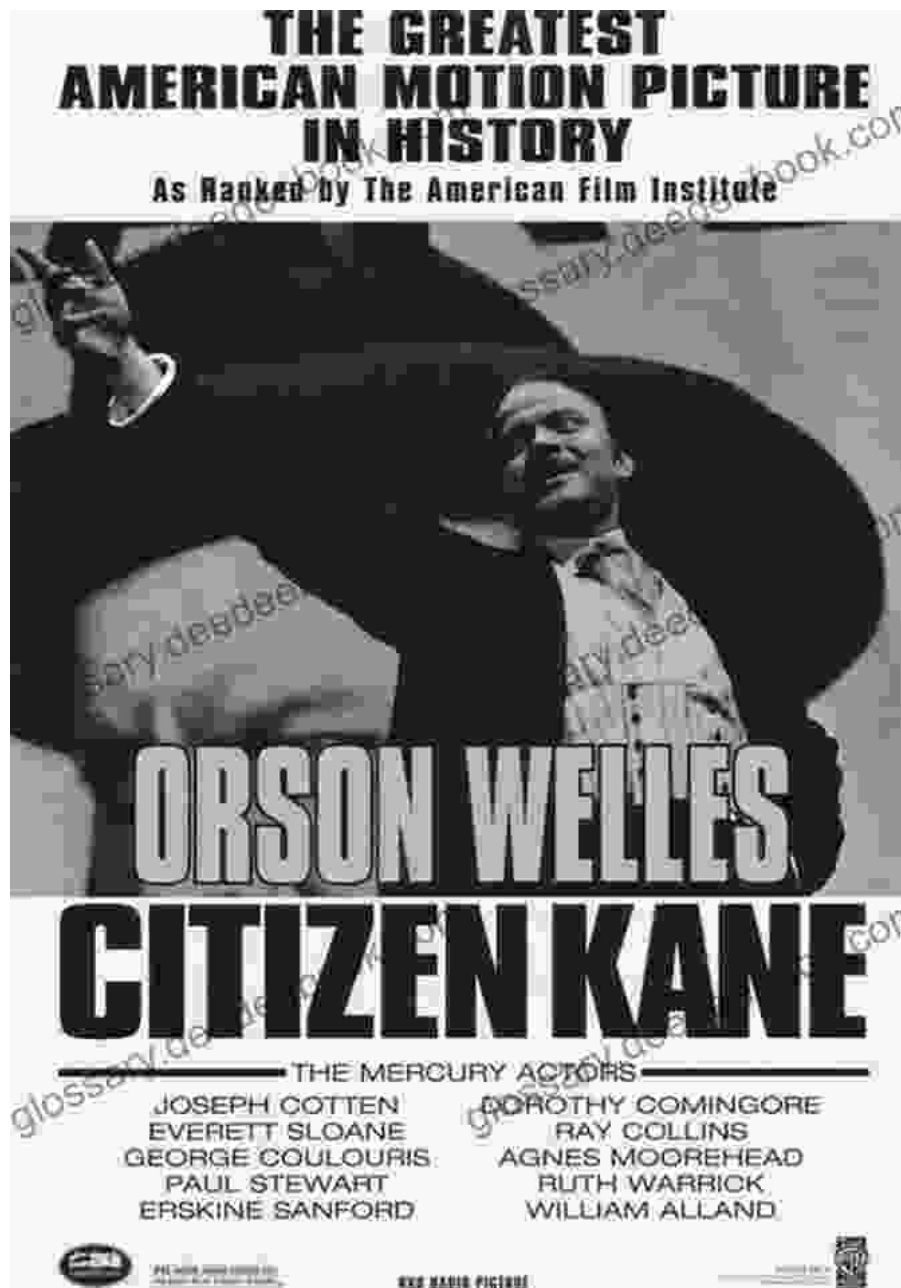
Industry News

In February 1941, the following industry news items were reported:

- The Motion Picture Association of America (MPAA) announced that it would adopt a new set of production codes. The new codes were designed to prevent the production of films that were considered to be immoral or harmful to children.
- The American Society of Cinematographers (ASC) held its annual awards ceremony. The award for Best Cinematography went to Gregg Toland for his work on Citizen Kane.
- The Academy of Motion Picture Arts and Sciences (AMPAS) announced the nominations for the 13th Academy Awards. Citizen Kane was nominated for 11 awards, including Best Picture, Best Director, and Best Actor.

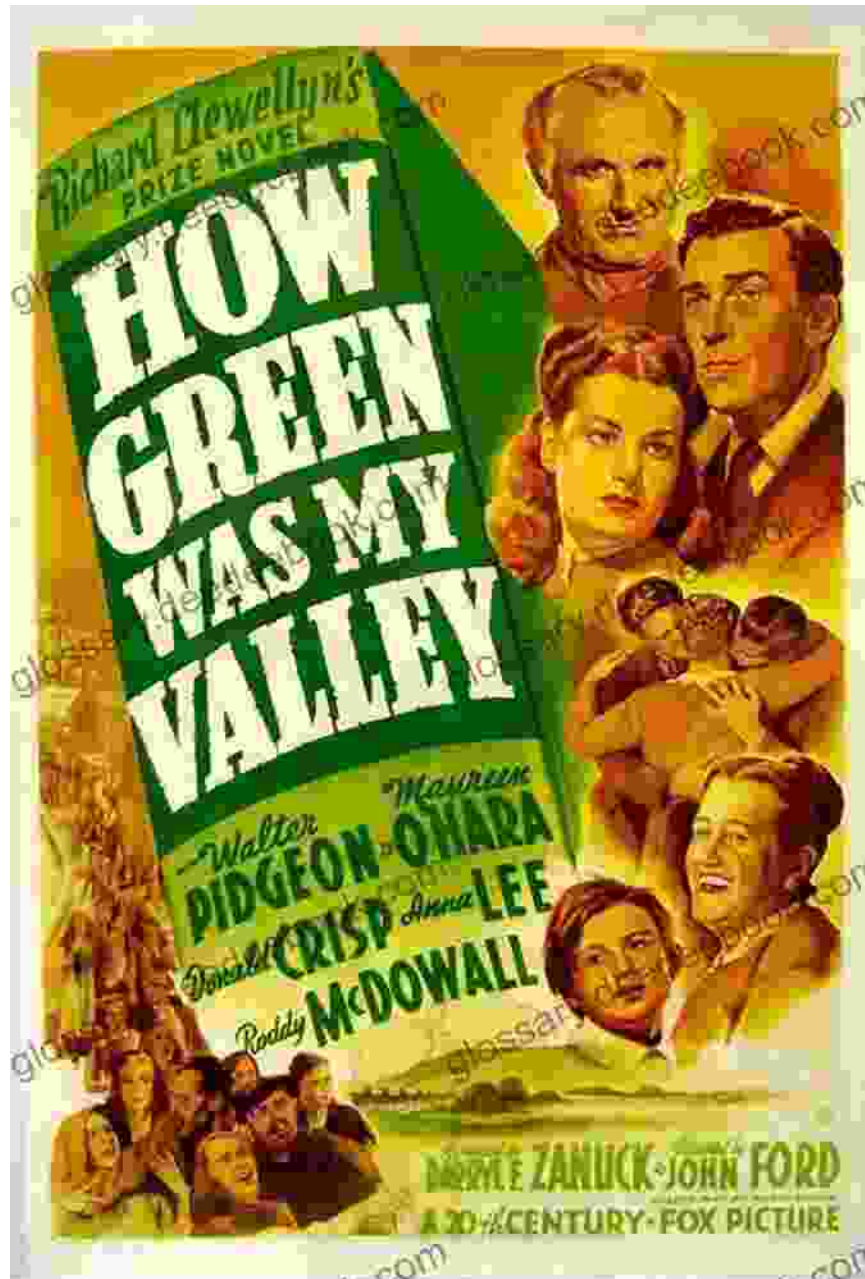

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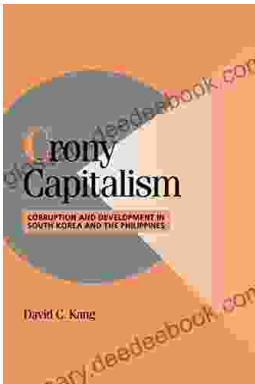
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
